### LORD HUNTLY'S CAVE

#### MUSIC BACKGROUND:



The composer of this piece, James Scott Skinner (1843-1927), was one of the first traditional Scots fiddlers to make records. He composed about 600 tunes in his lifetime and recorded his first discs (7" single-sided discs) at the age of 56 in Glasgow in 1899. (Cohen 1980) His discography lists four recordings of "The Marquis of Huntly's Farewell" two in 1899, one in 1906, and one in 1910 and there was also a recording of "The Marquis of Huntly" in 1908. (Anon. 2 n.d.) If he had recorded this piece around the turn of the century, it might well be the first and oldest recording of cave-inspired music. It is quite probable that this Jimmy Shand version is not the first recorded version of this march.

The title is more than likely referring to Huntly's Cave (despite slight spelling differences occasionally) located in a shady glen 2,5 miles north of Grantown-on-Spey in Morayshire, Scotland. It was here that George Huntly, the II Marquis of Huntly took refuge from the troops of the Covenant in 1644. Another story has it that he was the father of the first Duke of Gordon and he hid in this small cave during the Montrose troubles. There he was visited and supplied with food by Mary Grant of Frenchie [Sir John Grant of Freuchie] whom he later married. (Oldham 1975)

Slightly different information – "The cave is named after Lewis Gordon, 3rd Marquis (sic) of Huntly, who hid there for a time in the early 1640s [when pursued by the Earl of Argyll]. Gordon was a Royalist, loyal to the king Charles I, and had fought against the Covenanters, a religious and political movement that opposed the king's interference in the Presbyterian Church in Scotland. Because of his involvement in the Royalist campaign, Lewis Gordon was for a time forced into hiding in a cave in the vicinity of Castle Grant." (Anon. 4 n.d.)

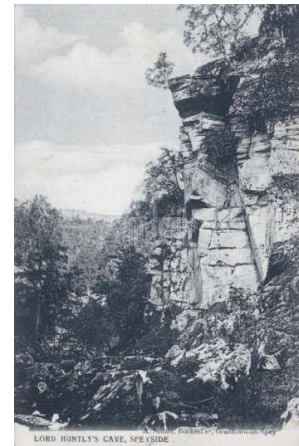

This was probably the first recording of "Lord Huntly's Cave." About 12 years later Jim Cameron did another version for Beltona (see next entry).

Regarding both accordionists we are told – "neither Jim Cameron nor Jimmy Shand could read music so that when Shand visited the Cameron Family, Jim's daughter May used to play new tunes for them [to] learn... Cameron went on to be the best selling post war artist and sales of Scottish dance music by his band were the main competitors to Jimmy Shand. Shand had had considerable success with his records for Beltona for whom he recorded from 1935 until 1945 but this was totally eclipsed by his subsequent sales for Parlophone. Until the Beatles released their first records, Shand was their best selling artist!" (Dean-Myatt 2004)

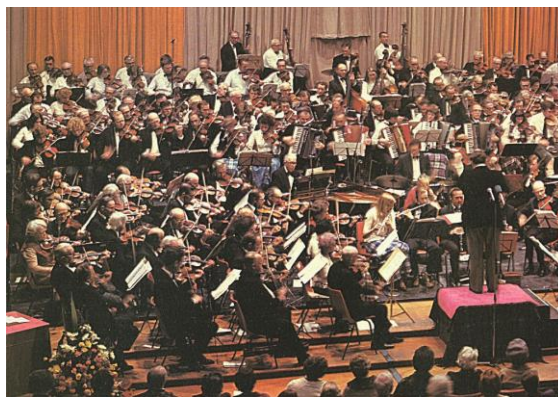

**Notes:** Once again the lively fiddle and pipe marching air followed by a quicker tempo rendering of the tune on fiddle with keyboard backing. However, Brian McNeill's fiddle sounds a bit squeaky at times. This piece is the first in a 3-part medley with – "Lady In the Bottle" & "Stewart Chisholm's Walkabout."

First formed by Brian McNeill and Alan Reid in 1969, the Battlefield Band broke up in 1978, then reformed the following year. Brian told about the new band – "When Alan and I changed the old Battlefield Band we decided to make it new and fresh again and we said, 'Right... this time we'll get bagpipes in and go the whole hog with electronic instruments, and we'll try different vocal textures.'" (Irwin 1986)

In 1994, the Battlefield Band celebrated their 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Line-up changes have been very frequent but "the new members always brought new music and ideas that have kept the band fresh and at the forefront of traditional music." (Liner notes) This piece was released on a promotional EP in 1980 when the band was changing personnel and labels.

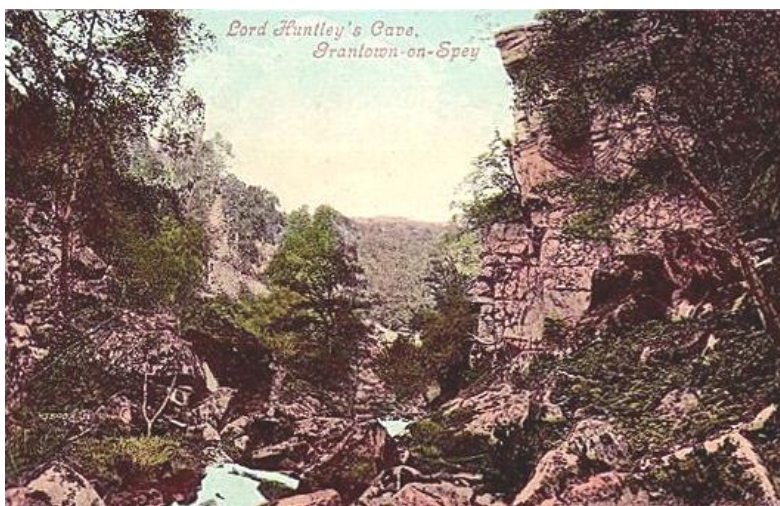

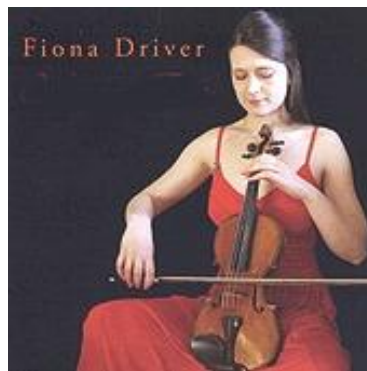

**Notes:** The second version of this piece by the Battlefield Band with Brian McNeill again on fiddle. The band broke up in 1978 and reformed a year later. At some point they decided, contrary to traditional standards, to add electronic instruments, a synthesizer and a drum machine. (Irwin 1986)

The synthesizer certainly adds nothing here and, as far as traditional music is concerned, it definitely detracts, even overriding the fiddle in the mix. One is grateful when, towards the end of this short piece the synthesizer steps back and lets the other instruments play. The bagpipes are not heard.

This tune is the first in a 3-part medley as in the previous version by the band. It was recorded during a live concert at the Winterfolkfestival in the Concerthall Kunstmin in Dodrecht, The Netherlands. Decidedly a far cry from the great live version by Bearsden Fiddlers in 1977.

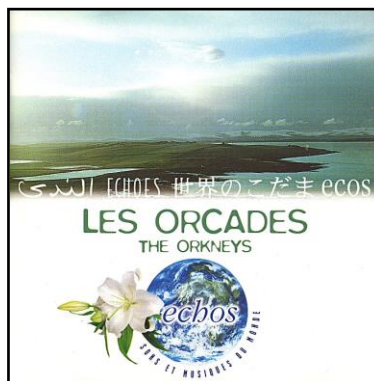
