FLOYD COLLINS WALTZ

SONG BACKGROUND for First Jenkins Ballad (See First Section – Early 1925 to 1950)

Due to the enormous popularity of the original song, "Death of Floyd Collins," the public demanded and got this waltz version that they could dance to, just as had happened the year before with Dalhart's tremendous hit, "The Prisoner's Song." (Walsh 1960)

This is a string band instrumental version with only the first stanza being sung near the end. As noted in the section on the first Jenkins ballad, the tune here was borrowed from, "Charles Guiteau" (ca. 1882), a ballad about the assassination of US President James Garfield while the latter in turn was based on another earlier ballad, "James A. Rogers" (1858). (Waltz n.d.)

In late 1925, this tune had been linked to the words of a political song composed by Andrew Jenkins, "Thomas E. Watson," which was recorded by Dalhart in Nov. 1925 (Columbia 15053) and on Jan. 28, 1926 (Edison Diamond Disc 51693). Thus by February 1926 the music had already made a re-appearance in the Dalhart repertoire within an entirely different context before being reinstated and re-associated with Floyd Collins.

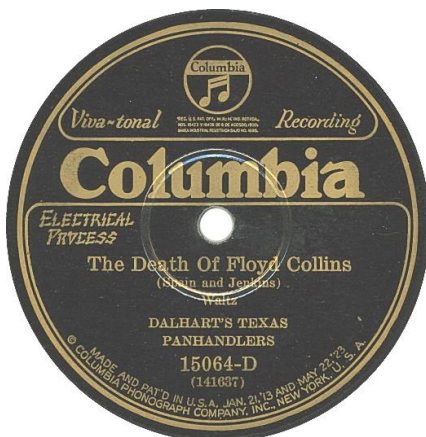

Notes: Columbia had also been the first to record a Dalhart version of the original ballad. Notice that the original ballad title is used here followed by the word "waltz" in parenthesis, whereas all the other versions are simply titled, "Floyd Collins Waltz."

In the 1920s Murray Kellner and his orchestra recorded several dance band records and he also did many sessions as a sideman. (Chadbourne 2012) But for the country records, Carson Robison tells how – "I had worked for long time with an excellent violinist [Kellner],

teaching him hill-billy style of 'fiddlin' and he had gotten really outstanding in this type of work and did all our dates with us." (Robison 1951)

On the reissue LP the labels sources are not given for each song. However, since the version which is included is listed under this title (shared only by the less known Pathé/Perfect version), it was probably this version which was reissued and not one of the five others.

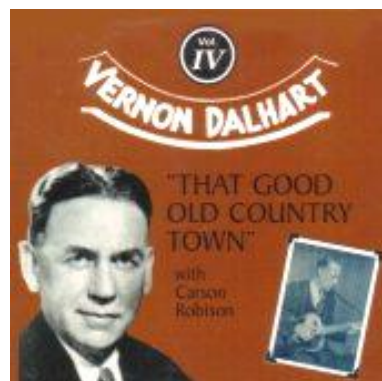
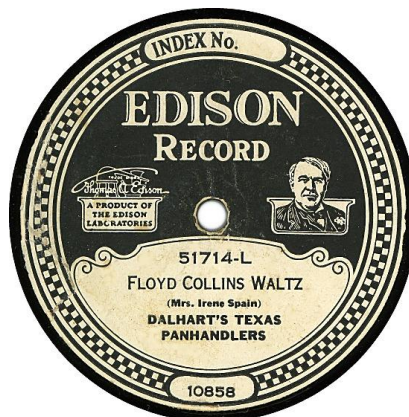

Notes: The label of the Perfect release falsely credits this string band waltz to "P. C. Brockman," who may well have been the producer or A&R man here, but he surely wasn't the composer.

The misappropriation of song authorship has a long history in the recording industry. Obviously this was done to appropriate the song royalties and cheat the true song writer out of his due. Regarding the first Jenkins ballad Andy Jenkins was "paid only for his recording [of the ballad] – the common twenty five-dollar fee – and never received anything as composer." (Wiggins 1987) However, G. M. Laws says otherwise –



“The composer was paid twenty-five dollars for the song and another twenty-five dollars for the recording he later made of it.” (Laws 1964) Polk Brockman who had originally commissioned the song from Jenkins may have considered the song his own, but it was up to the copyright holder, Shapiro, Bernstein & Co. in New York to straighten this out and properly pay the royalties to Jenkins.

As usual for the Floyd Collins waltz only the first stanza is sung and the first verse becomes – “Oh, come, oh, you good people...”

The only known published mention of it is in Russell & Pinson 2004.
