Notes: The word "cave" here clearly indicates a man-made underground shelter not a natural cave, but since compositions named after jazz cellars have been included in this discography it was felt that this one could be included also.

This Delta blues song is credited to "Mr. Honey" also known as David "Honeyboy" Edwards. "The venerable David 'Honeyboy' Edwards is considered a Chicago-by-way-of-Mississippi blues musician, the A-side of his first commercial recording, "Build a Cave," was waxed in Houston in 1951." (Record Fiend 2010)

Mr. Honey sings the chorus – I'm gonna build myself a cave
So I can move down underground.

It was not possible to get a transcription of the complete lyrics here. The guitar break here is everything a blues fan loves to hear.

Two years previously in 1949, John Lee Hooker recorded a song, which has a similar title, "Build Myself a Cave" (see below [JZ-BL3](#)). This Edwards song does use the chorus and a few other verses from the 1949 John Hooker song, but otherwise the stanzas are quite different.

The original ARC 78 is a rare one and can fetch well over \$40. It was seen in the January 2017 Blues World auction with a minimum bid of \$1,800.

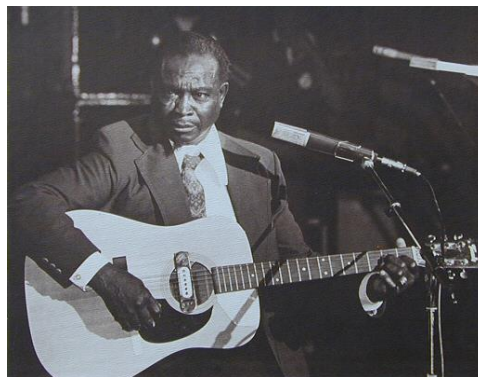

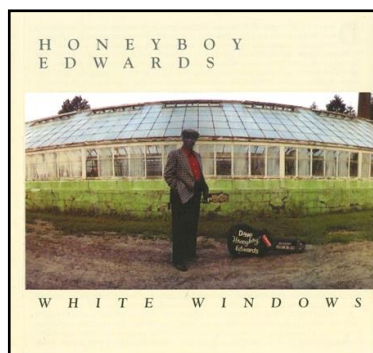

Notes: This is a third, somewhat longer version of the Honeyboy Edwards recording, "Build a Cave." Notice that Edwards recorded this song twice in 1988: once in Vienna and again in Toledo, Ohio. It is not known which recording came first nor how they differ.

The short audio clip available for audition at [CDUniverse](#) made it clear that Edwards uses here the same chorus and even a few verses (with some wording changes) from the 1949 John Lee Hooker blues song of the same title – CHORUS

I'm gonna build myself a cave
So I can move down in the ground.

It was not possible to audition the entire song.

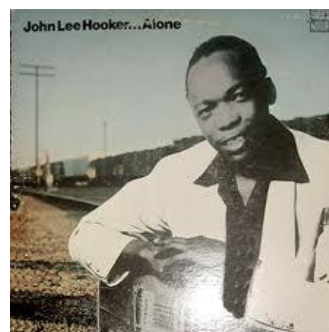

Notes: Cut at the beginning of Hooker's career in 1949 in Detroit by Bernard Besman, the man who discovered and recorded him, several of the pieces on this album were released for the first time here. (Hansen, Liner notes, 1970) The composition of this blues number is sometimes credited to William Gillum. Rich in the Mississippi Delta tradition, Hooker performs in a raw, hard-driving, style. In the first stanza, he sings –

Lord, I'm gonna build myself a cave
Heed 'em or move down in the ground.
Lord, I'm gonna build myself a cave
Lord, I'm gonna move down in the ground.

He goes on to tell how he found the Army draft questionnaire in his mailbox and Uncle Sam is calling him. Then he imagines his woman's response and about how she'll wait for him and won't have no other man. The bridge is as solid blues as it can get.

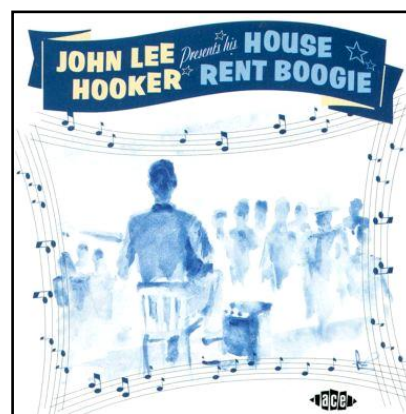

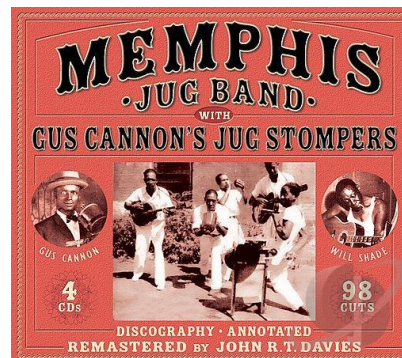

Notes: A real curiosity piece. One of the best and most famous jug bands to be recorded in the 1920s, the MJB offers us a humorous blues number ostensibly about coal miners. But the lyrics operate on several levels. Although this is the earliest known example of the use of the word "caveman" in a recorded song it soon becomes obvious that they are not referring to prehistoric caveman here no more than the opening dialogue is seriously meant to refer to coal miners (see [Lyrics LY-JZ2](#)). The word "caveman" is clearly used in a figurative sense to mean a sexually active male. However, the frequent use of "cave," "caveman," and even such expressions as "you caved" and "your cavin' soul" (taken on a first degree level) make this a perfectly valid cave song. Some of the most far-out lyrics you'll ever run across in any cave song pop up in Stanza 2:

You caved so much
You can't keep it hid
You gonna get in the wrong cave
Like Floyd Collins did.

This humorous yet sobering reference to the Collins tragedy that had taken place only 5 years before is a far cry from the sentimental message of certain Floyd Collins ballads. Regarding sociological studies of the American South, this is a remarkable example of where an event that had primarily concerned and affected the poor white community also affected, to some extent, the poor black community.

There is some debate as to the exact personnel on this recording. Some discographers have either "Bozo" or Charlie Nickerson (Will Shade said that they are the same man) doing the vocal, others have Charlie Burse or Tee Wee Blackman on guitar, and Walter Allen doesn't identify the jug player. The best, most accurate reference for the personnel here is the Victor Discography, University of California Santa Barbara. The drawing of the group by R. Crumb appeared on the Yazoo LP.

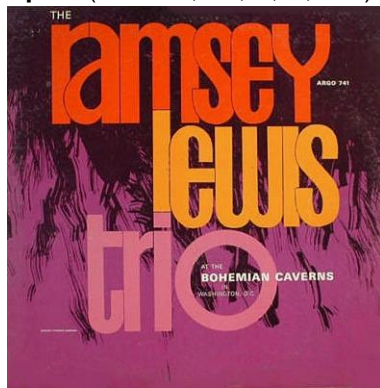

Notes: Everything on the original album was recorded live at the Bohemian Caverns, at 2001 Eleventh Street N.W., Washington, D.C. Located right in the heart of Washington, this jazz club provided an extremely cave-oriented interior décor from the stalactites, sculptured pillars, and flowstone right down to the little bats painted on the walls. The club owner, Tony Taylor, said "when we don't even have a strong act in the room to draw the people, there are a certain amount of individuals who might filter through here anyway, just to see the place." (Liner notes) In the past it was often affectionately called, "The Cave."

Ramsey Lewis wrote this particular number as a tribute to the club. One critic wrote that this was his only original piece on the album, "a roughshod piano blues jam called 'The Caves,' improvised no doubt for the date. Doesn't matter, it's a killer 12-bar with Ramsey pulling out his gospel and R&B chops to weave through his beautiful hard bop phrasing." (Jurek 2014)

Ramsey Lewis was playing funky before anyone invented the word and I'd like to suggest that he be named along with James Brown as one of the fathers of funk music. "By the mid-1960s, James Brown had developed his signature groove that emphasized the downbeat – with heavy emphasis on the first beat of every measure to etch his distinctive sound, rather than the backbeat that typified African American music" (Anon. 2015) OK, James Brown started recording singles in 1956 with The Famous Flames, but around the same time in '56 Ramsey's trio was recording stuff on Argo and some of their stuff had it alright. Try listening to their version of "[Carmen](#)" (1956) and you tell me if you can't hear the funk. Go ahead.

Basically, "The Caves" is down-to-earth rhythm 'n' blues given a solid subterranean feeling. With little imagination, some of the drum work might bring to mind the sound of a caver slowly plodding through sloppy cave mud. It was this aspect, which was stressed in the cave photos used to illustrate the excerpt from this jazz piece that was included in the "Caves On Phonograph Records" program in 1967 and was also used in my paper, "Speleo-Discography: A Progress Report," which I presented at the 2005 UIS (International Speleological Union) Congress at Kalamos in Greece.



The special funk jazz sound, originating from rhythm 'n' blues, that was created by Ramsey Lewis in the late fifties became a precursor sound that would be picked up and copied much later by the soul music arrangers. These rhythm patterns were the very heart of soul music.

This LP album "stayed on the charts for 47 weeks peaking at #2." (Galloway n.d.)

On the back cover of the original LP there are 3 small photos of each member of the trio playing at the club. Portions of the sculptured and scalloped cave wall décor can be seen in these shots. 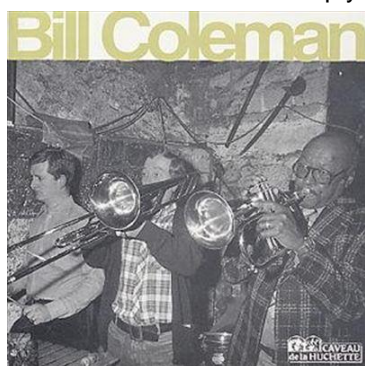

Notes: No doubt a tribute to the Parisian jazz cellar club, Caveau de la Huchette, located at 5 rue de la Huchette in the Latin Quarter. First opened after the war in 1949 it is one of the oldest jazz venues in Paris; For many years in the 1970s Dany Doriz ran it and Bill Coleman often performed there. The cover of this album shows a photo of them both working under its vaulted stone ceiling. The French word for cellar is "cave" so Coleman has simply transposed it and used the English word "cave." He sings –



Got the blues in the cave
Where my baby used to be;
I've got the blues in the cave
Where my baby used to be.
Now she's gone an' left me
I'm sad as I can be.

Bill Coleman recorded with Luis Russell in 1929 and later worked with Fats Waller and Teddy Wilson. He settled in France in 1948.

In 1951 Sidney Bechet recorded "Blues in the Cave" inspired by another Parisian jazz cellar club, Vieux Colombier (see under Jazz Music – [Dixieland JZ-DL1](#))
